

Good morning parents/carers and Year 1!

It is a snow day today so you will be staying at home but here is some work to do!

Please read through the learning which can be broken up into chunks throughout the day, and then explain to your child what to do.

Maths - 1 more and 1 less

- Using the 50 grid, practise choosing different numbers and counting forwards and backwards. You can do this by looking at the numbers or looking away at the numbers if you are confident.
- Choose different numbers and practise drawing tens and ones to show what they would look like as drawings. A ten is a line and a one is a small circle. If you ask your child what tens and ones drawings are, I am pretty sure they would be able to explain this very well!
- An adult needs to write a number up to 50 e.g. 43 and on the left side of the number label one less and on the right side of the number label one more. Practise finding one more and one less than numbers using the 50 grid to help you and writing these numbers in the correct places. **Remember numbers one less are always to the left and numbers one more are always to the right.** Please avoid using tens numbers as we will go through this together next week. After a bit of practise, use the sheet to complete questions. It will get harder the further down it goes, so please stop when your child can complete no more.

Sounds work - tricky words and dictated sentences

- Practise writing these tricky words. An adult will read them out loud; little, her, she, said, come, there, make. Correct any mistakes afterwards.
- An adult needs to write these sounds out for you and you need to say what the sounds are;
- ay ew ng oa

- An adult needs to read one word at a time for you to write. Afterwards, read the sentence by yourself.
- We can go swimming and play with the new float.
- Repeat with these sounds; ue ou ch ur
- Sue said ouch that hurt.

Geography - important reasons for oceans

- Can you remember the 5 oceans? If you have a globe at home or a world map, locate the oceans and recall the names. Here are the 5 oceans in order from largest to smallest; Pacific Ocean, Atlantic Ocean, Indian Ocean, Southern Ocean and Arctic Ocean.
- An adult needs to use the picture sheet to explain the reasons why oceans are important. We did this yesterday, please read the following sentences as a recap.
 - Oceans are important for habitats
 - Oceans are important for food
 - Oceans are important for carrying people and things to other countries
 - Oceans are important to help control weather
 - Oceans are important for oxygen to breathe
- An adult needs to use the next pictures after this to recap these important reasons with the pictures to help.
- Draw or print out the table and order the reasons from your most important reason the least important reason. Cut and stick the words or write them in and draw or cut and stick the matching pictures for the words. Remember it is what you think. What the is most important reason for the oceans?

Geography - Panama Canal

- An adult needs to use the pictures to go through the different ways of travelling to a place; what we call transport.
- Use the next picture to explain different transport can carry different things and then use the next picture to read these sentences for your child to match the correct picture to it verbally.
- Which transport would you use for...

- home to school
- London to school
- Wales to school
- France to school
- America to school
- Use the next picture to explain when people or things (goods) need transporting, they can be carried by ferries, container ships or oil tankers.
- These can sail across large Oceans to get from one country to another. Use the map picture to explain this.
- From Brazil to England, the container ships can carry oil or cars. From Australia to China the ships can carry metal. From Canada to England ships can carry food and from New Zealand to China ships can carry meat.
- Use the next picture to explain there is a canal in a country called Panama and it connects the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans. The canal can let large ships and tankers pass through so that they don't need to sail all the way around the land. It is like taking a shortcut!
- See if you can research with your grown up any other facts about Panama Canal ready to share with us when we return back to school. You could do a poster and draw the canal and write a matching fact. We could put some of these up in our window!

There are targets to practise on the homework section as well as reading, spellings and activities on Busy Things if you would like extra work.

Finally, after all of that hard work, please go out and play in the snow but ask your grown up first! Make a snowman, draw 2D shapes in the snow, go sledging with a grown up or play in the back garden instead. Make sure you get exercise to colour in wolves and this is also part of your Golden Time.
